Verizon Wireless JetPack

Jetpacks can be used for multiple devices. Network connection strength depends on user's location. JetPack can charge through an outlet or through the Chromebook. The battery can last up to 20 hours, depending on the type of use.

Samsung Chromebook 2

Ending your session, closing the device, or turning off the Chromebook removes any data, saved pages, passwords, and changes to settings. If you do not have a Google account, you may use a flashdrive to store and share files.

Not all sites will be Chrome compatible.

The average battery life is 8 hours, depending on the type of use.

If the kit is overdue, the Jetpack will not work at all, and the Chromebook will only have access to a specific library webpage for five-minute intervals.



Turn the Computer On and Off

Turn the Computer On

To use the Chromebook, you have to connect to the Internet and then log in with your Google account.

- 1 Connect the AC adapter.
- 2 If you open the LCD panel, the computer is automatically turned on.
- If the LCD panel is already opened, press the power button.



3 Power LED is lit while the computer is turned on.



Turn the Computer Off

Press and hold the Power button for about 8 seconds to shut down the Chromebook.

Press and hold the Power button for about 2 seconds to lock the system.

In this lock state, press and hold the Power button for 2 seconds to shut down the Chromebook.

To shut down the Chromebook when the system has frozen unexpectedly, press and hold the Power button for at least 8 seconds.



Moving the cursor on the screen


Place your finger on the touchpad slightly and move your finger.

The mouse cursor will move accordingly. Move your finger in the direction you wish to move the cursor.




Click Function

To click on an item, place a finger on the touch area and tap once. You can also do this by clicking once on the click area.




To select an item, place a finger on the touch area and quickly tap twice. You can also do this by quickly clicking twice on the click area.

To right-click, place two fingers on the touch area and tap once.


You can also do this by placing two fingers on the click area and clicking once.







How to Charge the Battery

Connect the AC adapter to the power input jack on the Chromebook. The battery will start charging. When charging is complete, the Charge LED turns green.

To check the remaining capacity of the battery, click the battery icon on the bottom- right of the screen.




Battery Usage Time Information

A battery is an expendable supply, so when using it over a long time, the capacity/battery life is shortened. If the battery life is reduced to under half of its initial time, we recommend purchasing a new battery.

When not using the battery for a long time, store the battery after charging it to 30-40% of its capacity. This extends the battery lifetime.

Connect your printer to Google Cloud Print

In order to print using the Google Cloud Print service, first connect your printer to the service. Google Cloud Print can print to either a Cloud Ready printer that can connect directly to the Internet or a classic printer that is plugged into a Windows or Mac computer with Internet access. If you are using a Chromebook and you attempt to print, you will be prompted to set up Google Cloud Print to connect a printer.



If your printer is Cloud Ready, follow your manufacturer's provided instructions or see setup information for Cloud Ready printers.

Connect a classic printer

To connect your classic printer, enable the Google Cloud Print connector using a Windows or Mac computer that's connected to the printer. You'll need Google Chrome 🗹 to be installed on the computer. If you're using Windows XP, make sure you also have the Microsoft XML paper specification pack 🗹 installed.



Once Google Chrome is installed, follow the steps below to enable the Google Cloud Print connector in Google Chrome.

- 1. Turn your printer on.
- 2. Log in to your user account on the Windows or Mac computer.
- 3. Open Google Chrome.
- Select Settings.
- Click Show advanced settings.
- 7. Scroll down to the "Google Cloud Print" section. Click Add printers.
- 8. If prompted, sign in with your Google Account.

If you signed up for 2-step verification 🗹, you need to enter an application-specific password instead of your Google Account password. You can generate the application-specific password on your Authorizing applications and sites 🗹 page.

Select the printers you want to connect, and then click Add printer(s).


The printer is now associated with your Google Account and connected to Google Cloud Print. You can print to this printer whenever you're signed in with the same Google Account on your Chromebook.

Why create a Google Account?

With a Google account, you have free access to Gmail, Google+, YouTube, and more, all with one username and password!
Having a Google account also allows you to save and share files with Google Drive and save webpages with Google Chrome.

Why Google asks for your information at signup

A Google Account gives you access to services such as Gmail, YouTube, and Google+. We ask for some personal information during sign-up in order to keep your account secure and make sure you have a great experience, no matter which Google service you use.

Name. Your name will be used across Google services. For example, when you create content that you want to share with others, your name will appear with this content.

Username. You will use your username, which will also be your new Gmail address, to sign in to your Google Account. Your username isn't case sensitive, and you can use letters, numbers, or periods. We'll help you out with some suggestions if you're having trouble finding a username you like.

Password. Keep your account secure by choosing a good password. When creating a password, be sure to do the following:

- · Choose a smart password.
- Do not reuse this password on another site.
- · Use our strength meter to help ensure your password is difficult to guess.
- Use at least eight characters.

Date of birth. Your date of birth helps us provide you with things like age-appropriate settings. We won't display it without your permission.

Gender. We will use your gender for things like improving our messages. For example, we will use the term "he" or "she" if you share a photo with someone. Anyone who views your profile or receives a message like this will know your gender -- it is public by default. But you can change who can see your gender once you've created your Google Account. If you specify "other" instead of "male" or "female," or choose to keep your gender private, we'll use gender-neutral terms (e.g., "Pat shared their photo with you.").

Mobile phone. Having a mobile phone number on your account is one of the easiest and most reliable ways to help keep your account safe. Since you have physical possession of your phone, we can provide easier ways for you to get back into your account if you ever forget your password. And we can use it to challenge unusual accesses to your account. This field is optional, but strongly recommended if you have a mobile phone.

Current email address. Current Email Address should be an additional email address, such as an address you used before signing up for your Google Account. For new Google Account users, providing this address allows for useful features including helping people find you, aiding in account security and recovery, and providing an alternate address for notifications from Google services. You can update this email address through your Account Settings.

Location. Enter your country or territory of residence in this field.

After you've created your account, you can review or edit this information through your Account Settings page. (Note that you cannot modify your date of birth on this page once you've created your account.)

Creating a strong password

To keep your account safe, here are a few tips on how to create a strong password:

Use a unique password for each of your important accounts

Use a different password for each of your important accounts, like your email and online banking accounts. Reusing passwords is risky. If someone figures out your password for one account, that person could potentially gain access to your email, address, and even your money.

Use a mix of letters, numbers, and symbols in your password

Using numbers, symbols and mix of upper and lower case letters in your password makes it harder for someone to guess your password. For example, an eight-character password with numbers, symbols and mixed-case letters is harder to guess because it has 30,000 times as many possible combinations than an eight-character password with only lower case letters.

Don't use personal information or common words as a password

Create a unique password that's unrelated to your personal information and uses a combination of letters, numbers, and symbols. For example, you can select a random word or phrase and insert letters and numbers into the beginning, middle, and end to make it extra difficult to guess (such as "sPo0kyh@ll0w3En"). Don't use simple words or phrases like "password" or "letmein," keyboard patterns such as "qwerty" or "qazwsx," or sequential patterns such as "abcd1234" which make your password easier to guess.

Make sure your backup password options are up-to-date and secure

Make sure to regularly update your recovery email address so that you can receive emails in case you need to reset your password. You can also add a phone number to receive password reset codes via text message. Many websites will also give you the option of answering a security question if you forget your password. If you can create your own question, try to come up with a question that has an answer only you would know. The answer shouldn't be something that someone can guess by scanning information you've posted online on blogs or social networking profiles. If you have to choose a question from a list of options, such as the city where you were born, try to find a way to make your answer unique by using some of the tips above. That way even if someone guesses the answer, they won't know how to enter it correctly.

Keep your passwords secure

Don't leave notes with your passwords to various sites on your computer or desk. People who walk by can easily steal this information and use it to compromise your account. If you decide to save your passwords in a file on your computer, create a unique name for the file so people don't know what's inside. Avoid giving the file an obvious name, such as "my passwords." If you have a difficult time remembering multiple passwords, a trusted password manager may be a good solution. Spend a few minutes checking out the reviews and reputations of these services.

Accessing the Network

4G LTE

With LTE bandwidth you can get the broadband speed you require to work efficiently outside the home or office. You can connect to the Internet, access your corporate intranet, check your email and download attachments at speeds that are up to 10 times faster than 3G*.

4G Mobile Broadband with LTE*

- Download: typical download speeds of 5-12 Mbps.
- Upload: typical upload speeds of 2-5 Mbps.

3G Mobile Broadband with EVDO Rev. A

- Download: typical download speeds of 600 kbps-1.4 Mbps with bursts up to 3.1 Mbps.
- Upload: typical upload speeds of 500-800 kbps with bursts up to 1.8 Mbps.

Wi-Fi 802.11a/b/g/n

- 802.11a uses the 5.0 GHz frequency with a bandwidth up to 12 Mbps.
- 802.11b uses the 2.4 GHz frequency with a bandwidth up to 12 Mbps.

Power the Jetpack On and Off

Power On

 Press the Power Button until the Jetpack display lights up. After the initial startup screens display, the Home screen and menu options are available.







Power Off

 Press and hold the Power Button until the display shows MiFi. The Jetpack will continue its shutdown process for several seconds and then automatically turn off the display.
